Generic, nonsensical or unacceptably brief	Some relevant evidence relating to their project (lacks details/specific examples)	Relevant and specific details provided (provides some real insight!)

[doesn't give enough detail to address the why, how or rationale]</i></p>	<p><i>A lot of my research was based on the direct effects that prison nurseries have on mothers such as psychological effects of depression and anxiety, but what I'd like to learn more about is what rights do mothers really have? Are they deemed unfit parents because they're in prison? Does that make them not allowed to actually raise their children in prison? Additionally if a family member of the child was brought to court to fight against the mother – who would win? What rights do each of the participating people have? Additionally...in my presentation I talk about how foster care is negative system that harms children because it opens them up to anxiety, stress and maltreatment, but is foster care more economically beneficial than prison nurseries? ... is something I'd like to go further in to.</i></p>
